Critics argue that **LHH continued operating more like an acute-care hospital rather than [like] a skilled nursing facility**, and that leadership failures contributed to the plan's ineffectiveness. These issues **eventually led to significant costs to the city in fines, penalties, lawsuit settlements, and consultant expenses related to LHH's recertification efforts**.
- **Subsequent Developments:** Following the decertification, a revised closure plan for LHH was released, and the hospital embarked on a journey to regain CMS certification. LHH eventually achieved Medicaid certification in August 2023 and Medicare certification in June 2024 **[five years after the failed 2019 60-Day "Reform" plan]**.
